## HOLIDAY ACTIVITIES

Our Christmas Party on Saturday evening, November 30th, followed by Open House the following day, was declared an unqualified success by all. As usual, Saturday evening's event was hosted by the Board members for our Volunteers, while Sunday afternoon was enjoyed by members and the general public.

The decorations and exhibits were the most ambitious ever undertaken for these events. Earl and Mary Ann Van Norman are to be commended for turning the Log Cabin Room into what appeared to us to be a toy shop, all items coming from the John Joseph attic. From

skates to puzzles, dolls with furniture and tea sets to Noah's Ark, and many other categories "too numerous to mention." In addition a country-type Cedar tree was most attractive with popcorn strings (made by Eric and Amber DiGerlando) and pretzels.

The Parlor corner cupboard displayed an early set of Nativity figures given to Mary Henry's Mother when an infant. This would give them a date of about 1875. Jim Shedlauskas made a plyboard platform which completely filled the bay window on which was set up a Christmas Tree (donated by Mr. & Mrs. Peters). Beneath its branches was a Putz, created by Bob Frick, complete with moss fields and sandy desert. Children were delighted to search for the wild turkey hidden in the "woods."

The evening party was enhanced by wine, many food donations, a spectacular pyramid of gelatin filled orange sections, and decorations by John Morrow. The DiGerlandos set out luminarias which guided us from the parking lot to the front door.

Naturally, Jacobsburg Brew was served at the Open House on Sunday.

Our thanks is due to those who spent many hours in preparation for these events, in decorations, exhibits and holiday delicacies. The events were followed, as usual, by additional hours of cleaning up and packing away all those things that were utilized.

## TOY COLLECTION ORGANIZED

When toys were gathered for the Christmas Open House exhibit they were culled from many nooks and crannies throughout the John Joseph attic. They came from drawers, chests, boxes and trunks - to which they were not returned.

In repacking the toys, similar items were placed in boxes according to established categories and a list placed in each box with a duplicate made for the curatorial file.

This is a long way from the task of cataloguing each item which must be done one day, but it is a definite step in the right direction.

#### RESEARCH

At the November meeting there was a discussion on the aims, purpose and goals of the Society. This discussion evolved into a decision to emphasize the uniqueness of the Henry Gun Factory located in this part of Pennsylvania. Most people are aware of Connecticut being the heart of the gun industry during the 19th C. but we have a segment of it right here. This is one of the things that makes our Society different.

The last two months have seen great progress in research, centering on the Gun Works and the buildings, both existing and lost, lying within the Jacobsburg and Boulton areas. Spearheaded by Jim Shedlauskas, old photographs, documents and maps are being gathered, together with copies of the Historic American Buildings Survey (H.A.B.S.) from the Library of Congress, showing the Gun Works in detail.

This is so vast a subject that a more detailed report cannot be made here. It is exciting to know that Jim is making small wood scale

models of all existing buildings as well as the Boulton Works and some Jacobsburg structures. These models, laid out in their correct locations will allow a visitor to have a bird's eye view of the entire historic district and see the relationship of one area to another. This will give us a superb interpretive tool which will increase in value as more information comes to light.

This interest is not limited to the Board members and Committee. Anyone and everyone in the Society who is interested, has information, or wants to learn about the industrial complex of Jacobsburg/Boulton should get in touch with us.


Several other trees are now looking for adoption. Call the office for information on this important program.
