He knew the burdens of householding for those several years fell on Jessie alone. And it was she who developed the Index after Charlie hit on the idea of a "names" index; the Contents would list the subject-matter chapters.

The following proposed amendment to the Society's By-Laws was approved by the Board of Directors on Wednesday, February 1, 1989.

Section 4. - Elections and terms of Office

a. The President, Vice Presidents, Secretary and Treasurer shall be elected for a one-year term by the Board of Directors at the First Monthly meeting after the start of the fiscal year following the Annual Meeting.
