

SUNDAY, APRIL 7 The Colonial Northampton Militia will hold a program titled "The School of the Soldier" from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the Henry Homestead.

Officers of the unit, with Rick Rehrig commanding, will inspect 52 members to make sure they understand their duty and have their equipment in proper order.

Particular attention will be paid to fire arms safety. Period uniforms and equipment will be shown. Drills and firing practices will be held on the grounds of the Homestead or of the John Joseph House.

HOMESTEAD RENTAL

The apartment in the Homestead has been rented and will be occupied next month by Bill Atherton. It seems fitting that Bill should occupy his family homestead as he has a deep feeling for the entire Boulton area.

Some small alterations are being considered to make the apartment a bit less "spartan" and a more gracious abode. Included in this plan is the addition of the old office to the living area. This will be made possible by opening a doorway through a modern plasterboard wall connecting the bedroom with the old office, creating a study or library for the apartment. The old office door will become a wall, giving the apartment but one entrance as before.

DATE FOUND FOR JOHN JOSEPH HOUSE ALTERATIONS

It is obvious that the Dining Room in the John Joseph House is a Victorian addition due to its architectural style. Examination of cellar foundations also points to the room having been added to the original structure. It is, therefore, assumed that the present Back Parlor once served as a Dining Room, with a pantry at the end of the hall which led into the Kitchen. A recent discovery seems to strengthen this conclusion.

Digging into the bottom of an upstairs closet recently, a strange wooden block with a handle on the back came to light. One edge of the block has curious metal "fingers" projecting from it. Written on the back in pencil is the notation that this was used to create the plaster cornice when the sliding double doors were installed between the two rooms. The date given is 1884.

To install doors that slide into a partition a second wall must be added to provide the "slot" for the doors to slide into. This new wall would call for reproducing the plaster cornice on the side facing into the room. For this purpose the wooden form with its handle was made.

We can, therefore, assume that, having built a new Dining Room (and that long narrow closet beside it to serve as a pantry), the old Dining Room was turned into a second Parlor, joining the two by a wide doorway with sliding doors. Having Front and Back Parlors was very common at this period, allowing a sort of Best Room and Family Room. When needed, both could be turned into a single large room. Thus, it would seem that we not only have a definite date for the Parlor doors but a most probable date for the construction of the present Dining Room.

On Wednesday, March 20, Bob Frick spoke to the Bethlehem Rotary Club.


On Monday, March 25, the Bethlehem Garden Club visited the Homestead and John Joseph House. Bob Frick was on hand for this visit.
