There are no federal estate or Pennsylvania inheritance taxes on these testamentary bequests.


When considering in your Will a bequest to the Society, consult with your attorney. Any officer or director of the Society is pleased to discuss with you the matter of gifts.

" IT'S TWINS ALMOST"

THE GUNNERY COMMITTEES LATEST ACQUISITIONS TO THE "HENRY ARMS COLLECTION "ARE TWO U.S. MODEL 1808 - 69 CALIBER CONTRACT MUSKETS . BOTH WERE PRODUCED BY WILLIAM HENRY II AT THE JACOBSBURG OR NAZARETH GUN FACTORIES . THE UNITED STATES CONTRACT WAS AWARDED THE HENRYS IN JUNE OF 1808 . THE CONTRACT WAS FOR 10,000 MUSKETS WITH DELIVERY AT A RATE OF 2,000 PER YEAR . BY 1812 APPROXIMATELY 4,200 WERE DELIVERED AND COST \$ 14.25 EACH . MOST OF THE DELIVERED MUSKETS WERE MARKED "J.J.HENRY , PHILA. ". A CONSIDERABLY LESSER NUMBER WERE MARKED "Wm.HENRY".

NOW, WHY ALMOST TWINS . THERE ARE TWO DIFFERENT KNOWN TYPES OF LOCK MARKINGS FOR THE MODEL 1808 WILLIAM HENRY MUSKETS AS SHOWN BELOW .



THIS HAS BEEN THE FIRST OPPORTUNITY TO ACQUIRE ANY ARMS MARKED "Wm. HENRY Jr. " OR " NAZARETH " . BOTH ARE IN FINE CONDITION AND ARE OUTSTANDING ADDITIONS TO OUR HENRY MARTIAL ARMS COLLECTION .

IF YOU'RE CURIOUS AS TO WHERE WE LOCATED THESE PIECES, THE "Wm.HENRY Jr. "CAME OUT OF BALTIMORE, MARYLAND AND THE "Wm. HENRY, NAZh "CAME TO US VIA TULSA, OKLAHOMA.


