What's a Bügel?

To Granville Henry from Gustav A. Reichel in Germany

(We thank Dr. K. Helmut Reich of the Universite de Fribourg Suisse in Switzerland for translating this from a German manuscript. The answer is upside down at the bottom of the page. --Don Repsher)

December 17, 1890

Dear Mr. Henry,

Dear friend, together with greetings I take the liberty to send you some lines.

Please excuse that I am again forced to trouble you with a question. Here it is: the other day my nephew lost the Bügel of my simple rifle. In case you have some spares on hand, kindly let me know, including the price, and information how to send the money. I shall then send the measurements of the Bügel, and the money.

If I had the right type of wood, maybe I could fix up a wooden Bügel from a rifle I brought from Germany; it had a Bügel of wood from a walnut tree.

My state of health is worse than that of the rifle; there is no healthy limb to be found from my head to my feet. This month it is exactly one year since I became ill, and I feel miserable most of the time. First I fell on my backbone, which will never be right again. Then I got a kind of flu, followed by neuralgia in my head and teeth. Some time ago I caught an erysipelas of the face which reappeared three times, because I could not take a long enough rest.

From all these wounds I get much pain, I feel almost as if I had been slain....

It would be a good thing if I could metamorphose and become a bear. Then I would need no boots nor other winter clothes; I could install myself for the winter and hibernate ...because the prospects are for a cold and tough winter! We had a storm for three days; the snow is over a foot deep, and on the trees it is frozen.

We thank Earl Van Norman for knowing the right answer: the Bügel was the trigger guard.... This letter also indicates the far-ranging extent of Granville Henry's personal and commercial friendships.


