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Our Open House Program for 1993 is well under way. So far this year we have had many visitors tour the Society properties and view the demonstrations.

Our standard displays and interpretation for the season are the Henry Gun Collection at the Henry Homestead and a variety of open hearth cooking demonstrations in the Summer Kitchen at the John Joseph Henry House. In addition, the following artisans are scheduled as listed below:

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#### ON THE ROAD!!!

May 9th was Mother's Day, Open House, and also a Road Show. The Jacobsburg Historical Society displayed a portion of the Henry Gun Collection at the Forks of the Delaware Gun Show at Agricultural Hall in Allentown. It was a tremendous success! This was the initial showing of our newly developed display and it drew a lot of attention to the Society. Many people from several states who were not aware of the location of the Henry Factory received an education on the Henry place in history and the Society's work in preserving that place. One of the features of the display was the newly acquired Henry Underhammer, along with another Underhammer on loan from a collector. These pieces were a source of a great deal of attention due to the fact that most collectors associate underhammer weapons with the New England industry, not Pennsylvania. A number of local Henry collectors have offered to display their collections at the Open House programs.

We received a trophy and a financial prize for our display. The trophy will be on display at the Homestead Museum.

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#### A NEW YOUTH ADVENTURE

A new Explorer Post is being formed in the Greater Nazareth area. Sponsored by the Jacobsburg Historical Society, Post 1776 will specialize in historical activities of the mid 1800's. Society members and other volunteers will have seminars and training sessions on the crafts and living skills used in the prime iron and gun making era of the Henry Gun Factory, 1820's - 1860's.

Blacksmithing, iron working, cooking, clothing making, farming and gardening, wood working, ice making, and particularly gun making, were all an important part of the Henry era legacy. These and other topics will be offered and explorers will have ample opportunities to pursue individual interests and apprentice under the watchful eyes and direction of recognized experts.

Exploring is a scouting program of the Boy Scouts of America, open to boys and girls ages 14 through 20, and is an opportunity for youth to learn leadership skills and decision making.

The first meeting of Post 1776 was held on Saturday, May 29, at the Henry Homestead.

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#### SOCIETY SPRING DINNER

The table decorations were the product of Board member John Morrow's horticultural class students from whom the Society has obtained them for many years.

Our speaker was Mr. Rex Norman, Supervisory Park Ranger at Valley Forge National Historical Park. Mr. Norman addressed the group in authentic Free Trapper's garb, and spoke on the Fur Trade of the early 1800's. The methods of both the great fur companies and individuals were explained, and the part played by the American Indian made clear. While Society members are familiar with the contract between John Jacob Astor and the Henry factory at Boulton for Indian trade guns, the speaker brought life to the lives of the people involved in the fur trade and the Indians who were the recipients of Henry guns.

In addition to Ranger Norman's beautiful elk-skin garments and various objects pertaining to the trappers' gear, Mr. Norman's enthusiasm was relayed to the audience and "a good time was had by all." Although the gathering was much pleased with the evening program, we regret that many members were absent, some having never experienced the pleasure of this annual Society function.

Plan now to attend our Fall Dinner Meeting which will be held on Thursday, October 28, 1993.

#### HOMESTEAD HEMLOCK

The large Hemlock growing next to the Homestead has been a source of concern for some time. While for safety some feel it should be removed, sentiment won out, and other treatment was called for.

All dead limbs have been removed, including one crown killed by lightning years ago. As many branches over the roof were eliminated as could be done and yet not denude that side of the tree. As an additional safety measure, two cables were installed to tie the double trunk together.

We now feel that danger to the house in case of a bad storm has been mitigated, and the additional sunlight on roof and dormers will be of great benefit to their preservation.

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### NOTES OF INTEREST

Thanks to the Hujsa brothers, we now have two apple trees which have been pruned and trimmed back to a productive state. The Hujsas have promised to continue to care for the fruit trees in our orchard this coming winter.

The Forks of the Delaware Garden Club has planted three Climbing Cecile Brunner roses on three corners of the new Arbor at the John Joseph Henry House. A Clematis by the fence that once enclosed the Summer Kitchen has been transplanted to the fourth corner of the Arbor.

With cooking demonstrations scheduled for each Open House, a supply of firewood became necessary. By gathering wood left about both places after tree cutting, this need has been met, as well as making our grounds more tidy. Enough of our own wood has been split to serve us for some time.
