AN UP-DATE in the saga of the new ROSE ARBOR in the John Joseph garden. Gerald Millheim has filled in the area to bring it up to level and has completed the brickwork at either end. The area has been seeded and the grass is growing nicely, and the roses that had been planted on the corners are high enough to reach the bottom crossbars of the Arbor. Two new benches that were built over patterns from parts of a bench found on the property have been completed and are now available to those who would like to sit and view the garden. Our hat is off to Bob Frick who is continually striving to win the battle with the weeds in the flower beds.

Over the past winter we had accumulated a <u>huge</u> pile of trimmings from the apple trees, brush removal, tree trimming in general, all of which were stacked behind the John Joseph Barn. These have been stored in the Homestead parking lot to be used in some of our flower beds.

### **NEW ACQUISITIONS**

THE BALTIMORE GUN SHOW PROVED TO BE VERY LUCKY THIS SPRING WITH OUR GUNNERY COMMITTEE LOCATING SEVERAL UNUSUAL AND RARE "HENRY" FIREARMS. ALTHOUGH NO ARMS WERE PURCHASED AT THE SHOW, SUBSEQUENT FOLLOW UP CONTACTS HAVE PRODUCED FRUIT.

- # 1 69 CALIBER COMMON WEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA ( C.P. ) CONTRACT FLINTLOCK MUSKET PATTERNED AFTER THE FRENCH MODEL 1763 CHARLEVILLE. THE HENRYS RECEIVED THIS CONTRACT IN DECEMBER 1797. THE CONTRACT WAS FOR 2000 MUSKETS. THE LOCK IS MARKED " HENRY " VERTICALLY AT THE REAR OF THE LOCK AND "CP" WITH CROSSED SABERS UNDER THE PAN. THE BARREL IS ALSO MARKED " CP ". A RARE PIECE WITH FEW EXAMPLES SURVIVING IN THIS GOOD TO VERY GOOD CONDITION.
- # 2 40 CALIBER "DERRINGER" TYPE PISTOL WITH A BACK ACTION PERCUSSION LOCK. THIS IS TRULY AN UNUSUAL PIECE IN THAT THE HENRYS MANUFACTURED VERY FEW PISTOLS AFTER THE 1840s. THE LOCK IS A PHILADELPHIA STYLE BACK ACTION, THE BARREL IS MARKED "HENRY" ON THE TOP FLAT. THE BARREL IS OCTAGON TO ROUND WITH A WEDDING BAND AT THE TRANSITION. THE BARREL APPEARS TO THE WRITER TO BE ONE OF THE EARLIER HENRY UNDER-HAMMER PISTOL BARRELS CUT DOWN AND FITTED INTO A DERRINGER STOCK. THIS ACQUISITION IS IN VERY FINE CONDITION.

BOTH OF THESE NEW ADDITIONS WILL BE ON DISPLAY EVERY OPEN HOUSE FOR THE BALANCE OF THE SEASON.

## CLEARING OF THE AREA AROUND THE SUMMER KITCHEN AND SMOKEHOUSE

All of the broken slate, gravel and rambling bushes have been removed. The Landscape Committee has prepared drawings of the area and are now working on drafting designs for a period herb garden in the space between the smokehouse and the grape arbor. This would give it close proximity to the Summer Kitchen where the herbs would be used. The DiGerlandos have built the frames and set them to provide a 2 foot path between the four beds. Joe DiGerlando has also weeded out all the poison ivy that had grown up into the grape vines.

Another portion of this project is to restore the grade to the ground behind the smokehouse and there to erect a wood chopping and wood storage shed to supply the cooking demonstrations being held in the Summer Kitchen. Thanks to Mary Ann Van Norman, Connie Unangst and Mark Amey, this year we have been fortunate enough to have cooking in the Summer Kitchen since the beginning of the Open House Season.

There are two remaining projects in this area: (1) to refurbish the root cellar. This would include shelving, storage crocks, improved lighting and possibly replacement of the stairs; (2) to reactivate the smokehouse. We are also in need of a volunteer(s) to paint the outside of the building. Contact <u>Jim Shedlauskas</u>, <u>Matt Morris</u>, or <u>Bob Frick</u> if you can help.

-An early framed map of the eastern portion of North America has been donated by Robert Hujsa. This piece is undated, but was drawn by D. Veelwaard and printed by A. Leusjer. The spelling points to a Dutch origin.

-A deed signed in three places by William Henry and dated 13 April 1797 has been presented by Mr. & Mrs. Walter Peters. This document is not only of value to us because of the signature, but also points to William Henry's service to the County as a Justice of the Peace.

# THE GUN MAKERS FAIR AT DIXON'S

JULY 30,31 & AUGUST 1, 1993
" ON THE ROAD AGAIN"

THE SOCIETY'S RETURN TO THE GUN MAKERS' FAIR WAS A TRULY DELIGHTFUL WEEKEND. THE WEATHER WAS PERFECT. AMOUNG THE UNIQUE DISPLAYS WERE SEVEN (7) UNDER HAMMER ARMS: 5 PISTOLS AND 2 RIFLES BUILT BY J.J. HENRY IN 1836-1839. SEVERAL OF THESE PIECES ARE BEAUTIFULLY ENGRAVED WITH FINE INLAYS. ALSO ON DISPLAY WAS A HENRY-MADE WAR OF 1812 SWORD, A HENRY NORTHWEST GUN MADE FOR THE AMERICAN FUR COMPANY AND SEVERAL FANTASTIC PENNSYLVANIA LONG RIFLES.


