THE INTERPRETER'S CORNER by Jim Wilson

Jacobsburg is located along the southernmost bounds of the slate belt in Northampton County. Naturally, the entrepreneurial Henry family took full advantage of this fact. In addition to their famous arms and iron industries at Jacobsburg, Henry's Forge and Boulton, the Henrys also played a role in the business of slate quarrying. In fact, in his 1894 column, Memories of Old Nazareth, which appeared in the Nazareth Item, John Woolf Jordan credits the Henrys as the first folks to quarry slate in the county in the early 1840s. Jordan wrote, "This slate was the first that was quarried in Northampton County, and was obtained near the Bushkill Creek a short distance above the gun factory of Judge Henry." Apparently this slate was quarried to manufacture a walkway in the Square at Nazareth Hall. Today its generally agreed that slate was first quarried in Northampton County in the early 1800s, at Slateford, in Upper Mount Bethel Township. But the Henry quarry operation that Jordan referred to predates the establishment of the slate industry in the nearby quarry boomtowns of Bangor, Pen Argyl and Wind Gap by more than a decade.

In addition to the slate quarry "a short distance above the gun factory of Judge Henry" (which exists today as a small "frog pond" near the intersection of the Henry's Woods and Jacobsburg Trails at Boulton"), the Henrys owned and operated the Boulton Slate Quarry from 1866 to 1873. Located off Filetown Road about one-half mile south of Boulton, the Boulton Slate Quarry appears to have been a substantial operation. A large "dump" of slate spoils surrounds the quarry, which has long been abandoned and serves as a private fishing and swimming hole today. Slate foundations for derricks and work shanties are visible on the dump and rusted iron cables litter the surrounding landscape. It would be interesting to know how many homes and other buildings in the surrounding communities were roofed with slate shingles manufactured at the Boulton Slate Quarry.

Not only did the Henrys make economic use of slate as part of their business enterprises, but they also made practical use of slate in the construction of their business infrastructure. Without exception, every milldam the Henrys built on Bushkill Creek to supply waterpower to the families industries, was located where the stream exposed a thick vein of slate. Built into a "rock-solid" outcrop of slate no doubt ensured the structural stability and integrity of the dams, a paramount concern with waterpowered industries.

From gunmaking to ironmaking to slate quarrying and more, the Henrys exploited local natural resources to create an impressive diversity of business enterprises in the upper Bushkill Creek Valley. In so doing, they have gone down in history as one of the most entrepreneurial families in early Northampton County.
