### Storm Leaves its Mark on Jacobsburg

In the early morning hours of Saturday, Sept. 18, on the date when many would be making preparations for Nazareth's Evening on Main St., the remnants of Hurricane Ivan rolled into the Bushkill Creek Watershed. By the time floodwaters crested along the Delaware on Sunday, everyone knew this storm would be one for the history books.

The greatest impact in the Jacobsburg area, however, was felt before noon on Saturday. By then the pedestrian bridge to Henry's Woods from the main parking lot, the Sober's Run historic stone arch bridge, and the 1935 steel bridge at Boulton, had all succumbed to the raging water the storm had unleashed. The water on the Boulton end of the Bushkill reached from the windows of the stone house all the way over and just past the gun factory site along Henry Road.

The pedestrian bridge had already been damaged by a storm and closed a few weeks prior, when it was hit by a large tree carried on the swollen creek. The bridge fell during this storm, and the day after, its stone abutment on the Henry's Woods side also fell into the creek. The stone bridge over Sober's Run was already out of service and blocked from any traffic for several years. It has collapsed, but fortunately the barricades built to block it off for safety are still there.

Having survived the flood of 1955 and numerous other high water events, the Boulton bridge buckled sometime shortly before noon on Saturday the 18<sup>th</sup>. PennDOT has already sought consultation from the Jacobsburg Historical Society and local citizens regarding issues of reconstruction. Until the bridge is replaced, detours will inconvenience visitors to the Homestead who are coming from the Route 33 or Belfast area.

In other parts of the park 12 small trail bridges and walkways were lost, approximately one-third of the trails were damaged, and the stream study teaching station washed away completely. No significant damage was reported around the Homestead or John Joseph House.

## A message from the president...

Jacobsburg has had its share of events this year but the two major hurricane remnants have certainly kept us on our toes. As the State bridge collapsed it sent water into the Stone House by the Bushkill and swept large boulders onto the lawn. But, we are on top of it and plan to have the place cleaned up and back in shape by mid October. The DCNR crews continue their efforts to replace trails and cope with washed out footbridges.

Several major events have been well attended and we have had hundreds of visitors at the historic Henry Homestead museum since it opened in May. We plan to keep it open on Sundays from 1:00 until 4:00 PM until November 1. If you have not seen the Pennsylvania Longrifle Museum, please drop in. You will be pleased with the quality of the displays.

In addition to the numerous events highlighted in the events section of the "Record" this year, The three major events planned for the fall are:

Our **Annual Membership Dinner** on Thursday October 21, with guest speaker Donald L. Fennimore of the Winterthur Museum whole will make a presentation on early 19<sup>th</sup> century furniture. We are planning for a good turn-

out for this famed curator. This meeting sets the stage for the next year as we share a brief status of the organization and plans for 2005. Please get your reservations in early.

On Saturday October 30-31 we have our **American Fur Trade Rendezvous** – with a pre- 1840 Primitive Living History encampment. There is something there for everyone with the Museum; the John Joseph Henry House, the Gunsmith and Blacksmith shops open for all. Jacobsburg members will have a tasty food concession as well as 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> century American dishes from our Summer Kitchen.



### Welcome to the Boulton Heritage Walk

After many years of hard work, preparation, and anticipation, the Boulton Heritage Walk has finally been completed. The wayside project includes 22 wayside exhibits situated at 10 sites along a half mile trail. Starting at the Boulton visitors parking lot, the trail traces a path from the gun works site over the footbridge to the Homestead and J. J. House.

Waysides are colorful outdoor exhibit panels with graphics and text, mounted on sturdy aluminum frames. Ours tell the story of the Henry family and their historically significant gun making industry which they established along the Bushkill Creek at Boulton. These waysides will greatly enhance a visitors experience here, allowing them to receive interpretive information about the park while walking at their own pace, without the need for a personal tour guide.

The project was a terrific collaboration of public and private partnerships working together to provide a service for Lehigh Valley residents and visitors alike. Although many people had a hand in making this happen the core team included Jim Wilson, former Heritage Program Specialist of Jacobsburg



Environmental Education Center; Dale Prinkey, Park Manager of Jacobsburg,; Mike Jones, Environmental Education Supervisor for State Parks in Eastern PA; and Matt Azeles, Chief of Environmental Information for PA State Parks at PA State Parks Central Office in Harrisburg.

A special thanks to Jacobsburg's maintenance crew who built the visitors deck at the Boulton parking lot, made vital trail

improvements, and installed the waysides. The crew that contributed several weeks of labor includes Terry Ginder, Jim Gibbard, Sam Merkel, and volunteer Ron Marshall. The DCNR Park Region 4 Swing Crew prepared the cement foundations for the waysides, so be assured they are built to last.

Funding for this project came from the PA Bureau of State Parks, PA Historical and Museum Commission, Delaware and Lehigh National Heritage Corridor and State Heritage Park, and the Jacobsburg Historical Society.

The Heritage Walk dedication ceremony scheduled for 1:00 pm Friday, Oct. 8 will feature special guest Jim Wilson, who will lead an interpretive wayside walk at 2:00 pm.

#### **Junior Historians Explore Jacobsburg**

This summer a group of young people "settled" into the Henry's Forge area of Jacobsburg Environmental Education Center. They were not there to farm or forge iron as the previous inhabitants had done. These students were here to investigate the cultural and natural history of the area by enrolling in the Junior Historians summer program held July 28-30 this year.

The Junior Historians is part of the Youth Environmental Learning Series, or YELS program, which are administered at many state park locations around the Commonwealth. Other YELS Programs offered at Jacobsburg include Touch and Grow (ages 4-5), Environmental Discovery (ages 6-8), and Junior Naturalist (ages 9-13).

For this year's Junior Historians program, a place-based educational model was used. The Bushkill Watershed was investigated during the stream study to recognize the value of the natural resources here at Jacobsburg. How the Lenape as first inhabitants made their living here, is our first link to the human history of the area. The students then took on the role of home-

steaders, and by way of a soil study determined the best place to "put down roots". Next was a study of

various 19th artifacts and tools Through direct observation, drawings and writings, students chronicled new information in their journals. Finally, the Henry heritage of gunmaking in Jacobsburg was studied, first the iron works of Henry's Forge, culminating in a tour of the Pennsylvania Longrifle Museum.

The ANNUAL MEMBERSHIP DINNER on October 21 is fast approaching. Guest speaker Donald L. Fennimore from the Winterthur Museum will present a slide program on early 19th century furniture. 


### Urban Research & Development Corporation Boulton Facilities Master Plan


## Looking Back....
