FIELD JOURNAL 1983 Virginia Lopresti

In May 1983 Pen Argyl students held a day-long field trip that ended at Jacobsburg. Twenty young people tried their hand at being amateur archaeologists along the north wall of the Jacobsburg Inn. They displayed great enthusiasm but were rewarded with only a few artifacts--early English ceramics and a few buttons.

The fourth Sunday of June being Open house at the Henry Homestead found Joe (Lopresti) and myself eagerly explaining our summer project to many visitors. We had two groups who were more interested than others, and they asked if they could come to help with the digging. We told them they would be most welcome.

I had attended the orientation meeting at Nazareth High School the previous week to meet our helpers for the summer. Again they were provided by the government agency, the Private Industry Council, formerly Manpower. Our very willing Theresa from 1982 was to help again plus two boys, Ron and Steve, all from Nazareth.

Early Monday, June 27, J.A., myself, and the three PIC youngsters were on the site. We were soon joined by John, Lynn, and Mike, volunteers who lived near Bethlehem, and by Mrs. Carol K. from Pen Argyl. The newcomers were given a history of Jacobsburg and details of the Jacobsburg Inn. The first order of business was to put up our Jacobsburg Archaeology signs and the second job was to cut weeds over the entire area.

Our investigation was to begin at the north end of the patio, the area where a stairway ascended to the second story porch. The loose dirt was thrown into a depression farther north. Two large stones had been left at the edge of the brick patio the year before. We were soon ready to move them into the inside of the Inn for future use. As the boys picked up the top stone, two very frightened garter snakes tried to go in every direction at once. They were soon wriggling in four young hands whose owners were loath to let them go. It was impressed upon them, however, that the snakes were State Park property, and the snakes were released inside the Inn to find a new home. Soon the area was ready for troweling. Again considerable window pane bits were collected on top of the brick surface that extended 6 ft. beyond the northeast corner of the stone building. We knew we were going to have a productive summer when our sharp-eyed volunteers found 3½ tiny blue seed beads and a milk glass button.

On Monday afternoon, Joe and all the boys cut weeds around the well that was farther north of the building. When the archaeology group from Muhlenberg College arrived, Joe took the boys 650 ft. up State park Road to the site of the Lantz home (1870 map). We think the site was a former shoemaker's home and workshop. Our group cut weeds for the female college crew while they staked out the site of a new archaeology dig. On the second day they took elevations from the Bushkill Creek to the site using a transit. They spent three weeks at the site for college credit. The artifacts they found were late 19th and early 20th century glass. They also uncovered the outline of the building. Professor Hope Luhman expects to return to the site in 1984 with a new group of students.

CHRISTIAN GOLD'S CHILDREN AND GRANDCHILDREN

Christian Gold was born in what is now the southeastern part of Bushkill Township on 25 Oct 1803, the fifth child and fourth son of George and Rosina (Ernst) Gold. Christian and Daniel, twin brothers, were baptized in their parents' home on 22 Nov 1803 by Rev. Johan Friedrich Frueauf, pastor of the Schoeneck Moravian Church. The sponsors for Christian were John and Susanna (Staut) Roth. Those for Daniel were Nicolaus and Susannah (Ehrenhardt) Seyfried. Daniel died 27 Mar 1805 at the age of 1 year, 5 months and 25 days, and was buried in the Schoeneck Moravian Cemetery. Christian lived fifty-five years in Bushkill Township, where he died on 23 Apr 1859. He and his wife Elizabeth were buried in the old part of the Union Cemetery near Belfast.

Christian Gold married Elizabeth Knecht, who was born 2 Jan 1807 and died 2 Feb 1880, daughter of Jonathan and Margaretha (Hauser) Knecht. The wives of Christian Gold and his brother Thomas were sisters. Both Christian and his brother Jacob had farms about a mile southwest of the Jacobsburg Inn, where their brother Thomas was innkeeper. Christian was a lumberman and a farmer. Christian and Elizabeth (Knecht) Gold had twelve children.

Their first child was Anna Caroline, born 10 Sep 1826; died 17 Feb 1851; married Samuel Heinrich August Siegfried (Henry A.), born 15 Feb 1825, son of Paul and Johanna Maria (Clewell) Siegfried. Children (Siegfried): (1) Ellen Clarisse, b 13 May 1846; d 20 Feb 1905; m 24 Dec 1865 Philip G. Schmickley. Their third child was James W. Gold, born 15 Dec 1829; died 10 Sep 1885; married Adalaide E. Giersch, born 11 Mar 1833; died 11 Oct 1883; daughter of C. William and Elenora (Clewell) Giersch. Children (Gold): (1) Ellen E., b 30 May 1854; d 9 May 1898; m Joseph Andrews. (2) Sarah C., b 2 Mar 1857; d 11 Sep 1936; m Zachariah Abel. The fourth child was Stephen Henry Gold, born 30 Apr 1833 and baptized 9 Jun 1833, the first of Christian's children to be baptized at the Union Church near Belfast; died at Nazareth 28 Nov 1909; married at Bath 10 Oct 1856 Mary Ann Remaly, born 1 Jun 1838, daughter of Joseph and Sarah (Lightcap) Remaly. The fifth child of Christian and Elizabeth Gold was Samuel, born 17 Dec 1834, who was baptized 22 Feb 1835 at the Schoeneck Moravian Church. He died 1 Nov 1837.

Their sixth child was Louisa Marietta, born 14 Oct 1836, who was baptized "Lovisa Mary" on 11 Dec 1836 at the Belfast Union Church. She died in 1898 and was buried at Moorestown. She was the wife of Levi F. Roth, who was born about 1831 and died 30 Sep 1894 in Bushkill Township. Children (Roth): (1) Maria E., b 1857; d 1928; m Daniel Heckman. The ninth child was Lewis Franklin Gold, born 23 Sep 1843; died 1 Jul 1906; buried in Nazareth Moravian Cemetery; private in Co. A, 153rd Regt., Pa. Vol. Inf. in the Civil War; married 23 Dec 1866 Maria E. Neumoyer, who died 1 Aug 1919 in Nazareth. One child: Alice L. Gold, b 3 Sep 1867 (or '68); d 19 Oct 1918; m Bethlehem 23 Oct 1890 Charles E. King of East Allen Tp, b 5 Jun 1869.

The tenth child was Elizabeth, born 19 Mar 1845; died 28 Mar 1908; married 11 Nov 1865 William H. Johnson, who was born 29 Nov 1840, and died 19 Jun 1902, son of Henry and Dora Johnson. Some of our members are descendants of Christian and Elizabeth (Knecht) Gold. Among their forty grandchildren whom we have listed, we wonder how many of our readers have found the names of their own grandparents or great-grandparents.

We have discussed previously plans for the Spring House on the Benade property across from the Park parking lot. The Society has voted \$750 for flooring and joists in the rehabilitation of the building. Flooring will be of yellow pine, tongue-and-groove style, 1 3/4 in. thick and kiln dried. This building promises to be another in the educational mold so successfully done with the Benade house itself.

Another A. J. Henry and Son percussion rifle has been given to the Society by a friend, as well as a chest of tools given by Louise Dawson and offered by Bruce Drinkhouse. We say thank you for all such gifts and express our appreciation.

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We are delighted to report that money is on hand for 600-700 copies of Charlie Sandwick's book, an edited version of all the articles printed in The Record concerning families in the Jacobsburg area.

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The Society has accepted Claude Jones's generous offer to repair and recondition the large "walking wheel" on display in the cabin room of the Homestead.

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The most exciting news of which we shall hear further is the plan to make the Homestead barn into a display/information center. Dale Prinkey, Ellis Neuner, Joe DiGerlando, Reginald Banks, Mike Jones, and Matt Morris have met with Jim Hartnett of Lanark Construction Co. to explore possibilities. Joe Lopresti is also a member of the committee. Recommendations include: Exterior - wooden shakes on roof, horizontal siding (2 layers with insulation between). Concrete floor in cow barn. Vapor barrier and herringbone brick floor. Laboratory for archaeology, with water and heat. An area for restoration work on the carriage, sleigh, etc. On the crrek side, a classroom, workshop, projection room, and small auditorium. A heated storage area in the forebay. An area to display wagons, carriages etc. Electric heat, possible toilet facilities, septic tank and drain field to service Homestead and barn. Upgrade present water system.

Dollars and cents will be explored, discussed, and reported later.

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Margaret Peters has agreed to serve on the Homestead Committee. This committee plans a housecleaning session before the first Open House on April 29.

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During the Lenten season, the Board is meeting the first Thursday of the month, rather than the first Wednesday.
