## THE INTERPRETER'S CORNER By Jim Wilson

On Saturday, September 22nd, from ll:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M., Jacobsburg Environmental Education Center and the Bushkill Stream conservancy will co-sponsor the tenth annual Bushkill Stream Festival. A celebration of the Bushkill Creek and its watershed, the event will be held, rain or shine, at the Henry's Woods Parking Lot and Henry's Forge Historic Site on Belfast Road, at Jacobsburg Environmental Education Center, Bushkill Township. In keeping with Northampton County's 250th Anniversary Celebration, this year's festival theme is "The Bushkill Creek: Building on the Past - Planning for the Future." This year's festival will thus emphasize the historical significance of the Bushkill as well as conservation efforts currently underway to preserve and protect Northampton County's largest watershed.

The Jacobsburg Historical Society and Jacobsburg Environmental Education Center partnership will sponsor the festival's history programming at the Henry's Forge Historic Site. Befitting the Jacobsburg reach of the Bushkill Creek, the history programming will focus on the area's gunmaking, ironmaking, and slate quarrying heritage. The Forge Office will be transformed into the "Heritage House at Henry's Forge" for the daylong celebration. There exhibits will interpret the story of the Henry family's ironmaking enterprises; a mighty regional story in its own right that is often obscured by the larger, more famous story of the family's renowned gunmaking industry. After all, Henry's Forge (built about 1808 by William Henry of Nazareth) and Catharine Furnace (built at Jacobsburg about 1825 by Matthew Henry) were the first iron forge and furnace in all of Northampton County. On the grounds of the Henry's Forge Historic Site outside the Forge Office, local craftsmen will be demonstrating the art and industry of blacksmithing and slate splitting. And gunsmiths from the Jacobsburg Historical Society will be demonstrating early American gunmaking.

This year, a special exhibit at the Henry's Forge Historic Site, celebrating the Bushkill Stream Festival and commemorating Northampton County's 250th Anniversary Celebration, will be Northampton County's Liberty Bell. The 236-pound bell was forged in Bethlehem in 1768 and placed in the cupola of the original county courthouse at Centre Square in downtown Easton. On the morning of Monday, July 8, 1776, the bell was rung to proclaim the signing of the Declaration of Independence, which had taken place four days earlier in Philadelphia. Nearly 170 years later, in 1945, thousands of Northampton County citizens rang the bell for 24 hours straight to herald the end of World War II.

Other activities at this year's Bushkill Stream Festival will include conservation demonstration programs, watershed exhibits, guided walks, and children's programs. Food service will be available through the Northampton County Junior Conservation School. So be sure to mark your calendar for Saturday, September 22nd, and bring your friends and family to this fun-filled, educational celebration!

### Excerpts from: Household Expenses, Boulton Landing (John Joseph Henry House)

#### September 1834

Cost of lot 8 acres and 19 perches at \$33.33-1/3 per acre - \$255.62 Surveying of same and deed - 4.50

#### September 5, 1834

Bought 1000 feet fence boards for house @ 20.50 per th. - 20.50 Bought 83 fence posts at 11 cents - 9.13 20 pounds of nails at 7 cents per pound - 41.40 1800 shingles - \$11.50

#### Boulton Dec. 28th 1834

Swartwood promises to deliver J.J.Henry 7000 shingles on or before the lst May 1834 to be of the best quality at 48 per thousand, to be taken out in rifles and store goods.

Received on account 1 Rifle at \$10

#### Household Expenses (cont'd.)

Sixteen different teamsters hauled 68,370 bricks for the "new" John Joseph house from as few as 500 per teamster to one John Johnson who carried 12,100 bricks and another who carried 13,620 bricks.

October 18 - "Iron Horses in Penn's Woods" is the topic of a lecture by Commonwealth Speaker Dr. Charles W. Boas.


