"WINE-MAKING IN EARLY AMERICA"

HISTORICAL WINE-MAKING COMES TO BOULTON

As part of our efforts to include fresh and interesting programs that touch upon early American life and culture, we're pleased to announce a new lecture series will be coming to Boulton. To help kickoff the 2012 season, on **Saturday, May** 5th at 5:30 p.m., noted winemaker and author Damian Siekonic will be giving a presentation on the traditional winemaking techniques that dominated the American wine industry from colonial times through to the early 20th century.

Before there were California's Napa Valley and the New York Finger Lakes, Americans had been making wonderful wines from many types of fruits other than grapes. In the 18th and 19th centuries the standard European grapes that we all enjoy today couldn't be grown on this continent and importing the favorite

wines of the day was an incredibly expensive undertaking. So people turned to the fruit and ingredients that were locally grown on their farms and using traditional winemaking techniques some truly amazing wines were produced.

This led winemakers Damian Siekonic and Don Becker to conduct an experiment one that would form the cornerstone of their recent book "A Guide to Winemaking in Early America." They set about sourcing fruit that was commonly grown in the eastern United States from the mid-18th century through the mid-19th century, and based on period recipes for wines made from this fruit, they divided the fruit into two equal batches and made wine from it using both the historical and modern winemaking methods. They then used the services of professional wine judges to describe the differences between the two. Since no examples of 18th or 19th century American wines exist, this was the closest anyone was ever going to get to experiencing real historical wine compared to wines of today. And the historically-made wine is amazing!

Thomas Jefferson loved his Scuppernong wine, so Siekonic and Becker drove to North Carolina and picked over two hundred pounds of Scuppernong grapes from a vineyard growing them there. The wine

made from the American Norton grape, originally developed circa 1820, was said to rival the full-bodied red wines of Europe, so they sourced the Norton from one of Rutgers University's science farms where it's being grown for research. Apple wine, raspberry wine and even a spiced mead made from honey were all represented in original recipes and made by Siekonic and Becker using reproduction winemaking equipment they put together to accurately replicate the conditions of a late 18^{th} century winery.

So whether you're interested in winemaking or just like drinking wine, come join us for this hour-long presentation. I've heard rumors there might even be wine tasting! Admission is free, so RSVP early as seats are limited.

EXHIBIT: THE HENRY INVOLVEMENT IN THE WAR OF 1812

The Museum committee is mounting a new exhibit for the 2012 season. The theme will be the Henry Gun Works' connection and involvement in the War of 1812. The Henrys served as civilian arms contractors for the U.S. government and also supplied arms to the States of Maryland and Delaware and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Included in the new exhibit will be Henry flintlock muskets and pistols, swords, military uniforms, flags and accourtements of the period. The Boulton Gun Works was erected, starting in 1812, to meet the Henry's production contracts. This exhibit hopes to bring this era of American history to life at the Pennsylvania Longrifle Museum. Also newly on display will be a set of lock patterns, believed to be from the Boulton factory, donated by Mrs. Gladys Butz, in memory of her husband Clifford.

Visit the table on the side porch of the John Joseph Henry House to learn more about volunteer opportunities. LANDIS VALLEY EXHIBIT HIGHLIGHTS LONG RIFLE

The Jacobsburg Historical Society is proud to partner with the Landis Valley Village and Farm Museum on the exhibit announced below. One of the guns on display is the Henry gun on regular loan to the Society from John William Moore.

EXHIBIT TO DISPLAY ARTISTRY OF ICONIC SYMBOL

LANCASTER, Pa—Landis Valley Village and Farm Museum announces the opening of its landmark exhibit, "The Golden Age of an American Art Form: The Lancaster Long Rifle." The display will be housed in the museum's Visitor Center and will remain open to the public through December, 2012.

The exhibit pulls together over 60 long rifles—drawing from the museum's collection, other institutions, and private collections, including the famous "Kindig Collection"—some never before seen by the public. The exhibit is made possible by a grant from the Richard C. von Hess Foundation.

Made by such revered gunsmiths as Jacob Dickert, Melchior Fordney, J. P. Beck, Andreas Albrecht, and Martin Mylin, among others, the rifles show a level of craftsmanship and detail that goes beyond the weapon's utilitarian use to bring the piece into the realm of art.

"Lancaster County gunsmiths were exquisite craftsmen who excelled at producing hand-made pieces incorporating highly refined artistic carving, engraving, and inlaying while at the same time satisfying the need for accurate hunting

weapons," says James Lewars, site director of the museum. "This is truly a unique display of early American firearms."

The long rifle form evolved from German-made wheel lock and flintlock Jaeger guns, some of which will be on display. The resulting long, slender weapon, often misnamed the "Kentucky Rifle," subsequently became an iconic national symbol, one that is closely associated with the taming of the frontier.

"Lancaster, because of its abundance of natural resources, but more importantly because of the immigration and settlement patterns of European German artisans and craftsmen, became the center of development of the long rifle," says Landis Valley curator Bruce Bomberger.

"By 1785, there were well over 100 gunsmiths, rifle barrel makers, and locksmiths working in what is now Lancaster, Lebanon, and Dauphin Counties," says John Kolar, one of the exhibit's guest curators.

"Competition breeds quality, innovation and artistry. To most of the men heading west, their rifle became their prize possession. Many of these firearms were adorned with finely engraved silver work and rococo carving that was equivalent to anything produced in Colonial America," says Kolar.

In addition to artistic elements, a number of firearms in the exhibit are of historic importance. For example, the "Miller Block House Rifle," a rifle made by gunsmith Joel Ferree in the late 1770's that survived a Shawnee ambush in 1783, is on display. Also surviving the American Revolution is a pistol used by Colonel Robert Clark of Lancaster, as well as a Jacob Dickert rifle that was taken to England as a trophy.

Made in Lancaster County, Pennsylvania from the 1770's to the 1840's—a period known as the "Golden Age" of rifle making—the rifles will share space with pistols, powder horns, game bags, gunsmithing tools, and contemporary images of the long rifle form. Lancaster gunsmiths also produced distinctive smooth-bore "Fowlers," which will be part of the exhibit as well. Copies of the accompanying book, The Lancaster Long Rifle, by guest curators Patrick Hornberger and John Kolar, can be purchased at the Weathervane, Landis Valley's museum store.

Situated on 100 acres, Landis Valley Village and Farm museum is a nationally significant living history village dedicated to collecting, preserving, and interpreting the history and culture of the Pennsylvania German community from 1740-1940. Landis Valley is administered by the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission with the active support of the Landis Valley Associates. In March we welcomed new instructor, Tammy Zettlemoyer of Zettlemoyer Pottery, who shared her knowledge of redware





open house began several years ago in order to show case the Henry


family home built in 1832 and lived in by the family until Mary Henry Stites bequeathed it to the Society in 1989. As staffing and

Hilton Rahn was one of our founding members. He was recruited by Kay Beers and Margaret Taylor, through their affiliation with Lafayette College. They knew that Hilton was an activist when it came to things he loved. That of course included sports, Lafayette College, and history. Hilton was involved at that time with the Northampton County Historical & Genealogical Society so they correctly ascertained that he was a natural to help get Jacobsburg Historical Society off to a good start.

Hilton jumped in with both feet running. Not only did he get involved, working at all our events, he also became our unofficial photographer, documenting all the activities and festivities. Hilton would help with everything from pitching tents to serving burgers. Whenever Kay and Margaret had an idea for fundraising or a fun event, they consulted Hilton first to get his input. They knew he could be counted on to not only help, but to get volunteers motivated with his good spirit and enthusiasm.

Hilton was a "class act." He had a somewhat dry sense of humor, but always had a quick smile and welcoming manner about him that helped to motivate the volunteers in those difficult startup years. When things seemed to be stalled with our negotiations with bureaucrats at any level, Hilton would do or say something that would help to "motivate the troops" to try harder and not give in or give up. He helped us to navigate the publicity road, insuring that we had good press coverage for our events.
